NORTH WESSEX DOWNS AREA OF OUTSTANDING NATURAL BEAUTY

ANNUAL FORUM 15 NOVEMBER 2019

I attended the Forum as the parish's representative and this is a report of key relevant points. As

context, the AONB extends from Cherhill in the west to Theale in the east and from close to

Wantage in the north to Whitchurch in the south. One of 34 AONBs in England, it covers 173

parishes in whole or in part, 668 square miles, over 100,000 people, and the northern part of the

UNESCO WHS. The National Parks and Access to Countryside Act (1949) is the statutory authority.

The Forum attracted over 90 registrations. The first part of the morning was taken up by formal

presentations. One focused on the AONB's management plan 2019-24. This sets out objectives with

detailed actions to achieve them. For us a key point is the legal obligation to "have regard to the

purpose of conserving and enhancing the natural beauty of the area" when taking any action that

might otherwise have adverse impacts. The WHS management plan has similar language.

The second part of the morning was dedicated to so-called masterclasses. I attended two. The first

was on sustainable tourism; the second was on neighbourhood plans. The tourism masterclass was

led by the organiser of the Pewsey Vale Tourism Partnership. Run by volunteers, it brings together

businesses of all kinds and encourages information and best practice-sharing to maximise

engagement with visitors to the area and attract others to it. It has been successful in building a

representative group of members, each paying £55/year. The Partnership has yet to work out how

to measure its impact though the positive response of the membership is one indication.

The second masterclass was led by an architect and town planner specialising in helping local

authorities create neighbourhood plans. These plans cannot prevent incoming development but can

help to shape it. Planning authorities are obliged to take a neighbourhood plan into consideration

when reaching decisions. However the cost and time necessary to create a plan puts it out of reach

of a small parish like Avebury. In any case we have certain protections as a consequence of being in

the WHS and having a conservation area.

It was worth attending the meeting. There may be ways in which the AONB can work with us to help

us complete some of our projects.
