Mud on the roads ; Advice for farmers using public highways

We are receiving many reports from drivers about dangerous conditions being created by mud being deposited on the roads.

This is not an uncommon problem at this time of year given the weather conditions and the agricultural community working hard in the fields. Unfortunately, the farmers and contractors may well be bringing significant amounts of soil from the fields and onto the road network whilst going about their normal business.

Farmers and contractors are legally obliged to ensure if their vehicles leave mud or any other deposits on the road, they clean it up.

There is also a legal requirement for them to place out signs compliant with the traffic signs regulation 2016 to warn motorists of the conditions of the road. If they don't they could be liable for a number of offences under the Highways act 1988.

It is vital for farmers and contractors to know their responsibilities when it comes to leaving mud and other deposits on the road, and particularly the consequences of not conforming with the law.

Cleaning mud off agricultural vehicles prior to going on to a public highway should be done whenever possible to help keep the roads safe. Although cleaning mud off agricultural machinery is inconvenient it may not be a defence in law.

HOME SECURITY



Don't be caught out by burglars!



Remember the following advice to improve the security in and around your home:

-  Lock your doors and windows every time you leave the house, even when just in the garden. And make sure you have approved locks or bolts to all doors and windows.
- Never leave a spare key in a hiding place like in a plant pot or letter box - a thief knows all the hiding places.
- Keep all keys, purses and wallets out of sight and away from the letterbox.

Make sure any bolts are low enough so they cannot be opened by reaching over the top of the gate.

-  Trim back any plants and hedges at the front of your property to no higher than one meter to remove hiding places.

Always report any suspicious activity, note any vehicle registrations, descriptions of persons involved and direction of travel.

- Register all serial numbers from electrical items, tools and garden equipment with Immobilise.com the free national property register. Mark items without serial numbers with an artificial DNA property marker such as Smartwater or SelectaDNA.
- Take photographs of all jewellery including hallmarks and keep them safe. Also consider using an artificial DNA property marker on jewellery or other valuable items.

-  Do not open the door to anyone you don't know or are not expecting. Always check by using a spy-hole or look through a window. Don't trust an ID card.

-  Consider installing a burglar alarm, and only use a company that is registered or certified with the NSI or the SSIAB.

Use a timer to set lights to mimic your usual activity when you are not at home.

-  Do not keep large amounts of cash at home - it is much safer in a bank or building society.

Make sure that you have up to date contents insurance.

PRIORITIES IN YOUR AREA:

Retail Theft (Marlborough)

Due to an increase in retail thefts we have decided this will now be a priority for our East Sector officers.

Officers will be planning operations and carrying out pulse patrols during peak shopping times.

High Visibility Patrols are being conducted.

Anti-Social Behaviour –Pewsey (Vale Road, Olympian Road)

It is essential that we tackle anti-social behaviour (ASB) within our community. ASB is defined as, “*Acting in a manner that caused or was likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to one or more persons not of the same household.*”

Officers are remaining to conduct daily patrols of these areas at all times of day & night.

ADVICE:

Please report any behaviour as defined above to 101.

Rural Crime (Pewsey & Marlborough) – Hare-coursing, Beauty Spot Thefts, Church Patrols

It is imperative that we maintain a high visible presence within our rural county.

Albeit the weather is now turning, we are still aiming to regularly patrol our Beauty Spots and rural sites including churches.

Due to their rural nature and number of visitors, they do unfortunately become a target of crime.

These patrols are now including farm land by the permission of the land owners

ADVICE:

It is important for members of the public not to leave any valuables within their vehicles. It is also important for members of the Public to report any suspicious activity to us.

05/10 - 12/10 – **Rockley** – Burglary - Unknown persons have gained entry to property via unsecured door and have taken a large amount of silver goods two £100,000

11/10/2019 – **Winterbourne Monkton** - Unknown person(s) have attempted to jimmy open a works vehicle. Entry was unsuccessful nothing taken.

13/10/2019 – **Avebury** - Vehicle crime - Unknown person(s) have smashed the passenger side window of a vehicle. Unknown if anything has been stolen.

13/10/2019 – **Avebury** – Vehicle crime - Unknown person(s) have smashed the passenger side window of the vehicle and taken a handbag containing a wallet with a driving licence, £150.00 cash and bank cards.

15/10/2019 – **Aldbourn** – Vehicle crime - persons(s) have gained entry into vehicle and have stolen items :- drill batteries cost £2000, a radio battery and a packet of cigarettes.

15/10/2019 – **Aldbourn** – Vehicle crime - Unknown person(s) have used a weapon in an attempt to force entry into a vehicle. Damage has been caused to the side loading door and to the lock around the driver side front door. No entry gained.

17/10/2019 – **Aldbourn** – Fraud - Unknown person(s) have defrauded elderly persons bank account of £25,000 – Action Fraud investigating.

18/10/2019 – **West overton** - suspicious incident - Unknown substance that appears to be rat poison has been scattered/piled close to garages. We advise dog owners in the area to exercise caution when walking dogs off the lead.

22/10/2019 – **Silbury hill car park** – vehicle crime - Unknown person(s) have smashed the passenger side window of a parked vehicle at a local beauty spot and have stolen 2 x holdalls from inside the car containing personal items and currency.

25/10/2019 – **Silbury hill** – Vehicle crime - Unknown person(s) have smashed the passenger side window of a parked vehicle a brown leather handbag containing currency and personal items has been taken.

26/10/2019 – **Mildenhall** - Unknown person(s) have broken into a farm unit and stolen metal that was stored within other units on the yard owned by different businesses were also targetted at the same time entry was not gained to all units.
